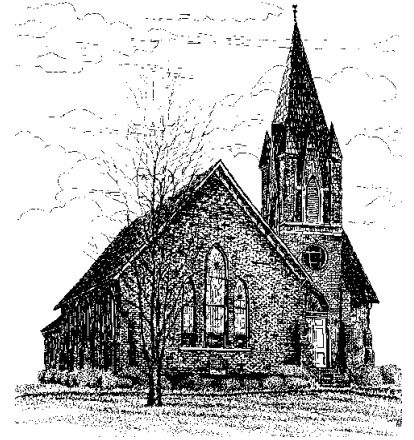

From the Pastor

As this issue of Trinity in Touch goes out we are in the middle of Holy Week. Many of us have been gathering at Divine Saviour Catholic Church for our midday worship services and meals. Many have been spending extra time reading from the Gospel accounts of Jesus' last days. Almost everybody is planning on gathering on Thursday night for our Maundy Thursday worship service. At the same time, even as we are concerned with Holy Week, we are also thinking about Easter and Spring Break! Admittedly, not all of us are fortunate enough to be able to take Spring Break off. Some of us were off for a few days earlier. Some will have to wait until summer to get some time off. Others get nervous even thinking about being off!

But all of us are looking toward Easter! The hope that we feel as we come together to worship God rises from the deepest places within us. It goes beyond the new clothes that we find the children wearing. It goes beyond the beauty of the flowers that we bring from our yards and use to "flower" the Cross in the churchyard. It goes beyond the powerful music that resonates from the Sanctuary on Easter Sunday—"Christ the Lord is Risen Today," "Up From the Grave He Arose," "He Lives," "Easter People Raise Your Voices," and all of the other stately Easter songs. Even the more somber Easter songs like "In the Garden" draw a response from us that comes from the heart. We are looking toward Easter and its promise of renewal and new life.

I think I have written before about my Grandmother's complaint one year at Easter. The minister had preached a powerful sermon about Easter and people being able to live with hope because of Jesus' resurrection. He had given some powerful examples of how we can keep going in this world when we know that God is in control and that we are in God's hands. It was one of those sermons that made me glad I had been there in worship. Then, on the way out the door, my Grandmother remarked with a sniff, "Didn't offer much for those of us who are getting close to death." If I had been chewing gum I would have swallowed it! The message that I was carrying from the sermon was that not even death can defeat God. The message that I was carrying was that no matter where we go or what we do, or what comes our way, our God is larger than the problems and is with us through whatever comes our way.

Since last Easter we have all had some experiences with death. Many of us have lost loved ones, others have stood close to families during their times of grief. Others have faced illnesses that have reminded us that we are in God's hands and that death comes to each of us. What a comfort it is to be able to proclaim with Paul that "Death has been swallowed up in victory." My feeling is that if God has been faithful and cared for us so far in our lives, will he not continue to be faithful and watch over us if we trust him even in the face of death? Easter is a reminder of God's faithfulness and love. It is a reminder of our hope through Jesus Christ.

Looking back at what my grandmother was experiencing I can see now that she was feeling the same sort of anxiety that we feel when we are looking at any major change in life—the first day of school, the first day of a new job, the first day of retirement... Just the change is frightening, even when we know that things are in God's hands and therefore under control. A natural anxiety is understandable, but we simply keep reminding ourselves that God is good and God is in control. Easter is our reminder of God's control and of God's faithfulness.

Somewhere in my files I have a copy of a poem that talks about God's faithfulness through all of life and death. In the margin of this particular copy is a handwritten note from a church member who was suffering from a serious illness. His prognosis was not good at all. He was aware of how serious things were, but wrote the following note: "There's nothing that I'm going to face today, Lord, that you and I can't handle."

Easter is our promise that there is nothing that God will not help us through! Our call is to put our trust in God and to celebrate the resurrection. Have a very happy Easter. God bless each one. Gene Feagin, Pastor
